Christie's Bridge Scandal Isn't Going Anywhere

As it becomes more clear that Chris Christie's Administration sought retribution against the Mayor of Fort Lee by shutting down lanes on the George Washington Bridge, Christie is under heavy fire from both parties.

Today, DNC Communications Director, Mo Elleithee, put out a memo on Christie's most recent polling numbers, and the negative light it shines on Christie's future. Read an excerpt from that memo below:

Looking at the polling, there is no question that Christie has taken a hit – maybe not politically fatal, but definitely real. What the numbers also show, is that he had some tough hurdles to overcome in the first place, and this whole episode didn't make it any better.

- Christie's approval rating has taken a big dip. According to Quinnipiac, Christie's approval rating in New Jersey has dropped to its lowest point in 16 months. In fact, over the past 11 months, he's seen a 19-point drop in his overall approval rating. In the Monmouth University/Asbury Park Press poll, Christie's approval has fallen six points since the election, and his disapproval rating has nearly doubled since last February.
- **He's losing Democrats...** One of Christie's top talking points was his ability to attract Democratic voters. The latest <u>Quinnipiac poll</u> shows a 20 point drop in approval among Democratic voters over the past year.
- ... and he's taken a hit with Independents. According to the Monmouth/APP poll, Christie has taken an 11-point hit in his approval rating among Independents since last month
- A lot of people see him as a bully. According to the Q poll, forty percent of New Jersey voters consider their Governor a bully. Let that sink in for a moment. Four in ten of his constituents think he's a bully.
- A lot of people think he's lying.... According to the <u>Q poll</u>, more than four in ten New Jersey voters said they believe he knew what his aides were doing. According to a Monmouth University/Asbury Park Press poll, <u>about half</u> of New Jersey adults believe he knew about his staff's actions before the emails became public, and <u>51% believe he has not been "completely honest" about what he knows.</u> That's a lot of people who believe their governor who they have gotten to know over four years is lying to them. Nationally, <u>the Reuters poll</u> shows that <u>only 28% of Americans believe the Governor's story that he had no advance knowledge.</u>
- ... and that there should be consequences. A whopping 65% of New Jersey voters in the Q poll believe that if he *did* know, he should be removed from office and/or prosecuted on criminal charges.
- He's seen as a political opportunist not the "straight-shooter" he claimed to be in his reelection. According to the Monmouth/APP poll, 47% of New Jersey residents think he is more concerned about his political future than governing up from 38% in September.
- **People believe this hurts his political future.** According to the Q poll, 56% of New Jersey voters believe that the scandal damages or ends his chances as a 2016 contender.
- And it's undermined his "electability" argument. For months, Christie supporters have argued he'd
 be the most electable candidate in 2016. But now there's reason to question that. A month ago,
 NBC/Marist had him trailing a hypothetical presidential general election matchup by 3 points. This week,
 that same poll has him trailing by 13 points!

As Chuck Todd put it yesterday morning on the TODAY Show, "A month ago it was basically a dead even race. Now it's a 13-point lead. All of a sudden, Chris Christie is polling no better than any other generic Republican candidate. And because he already had problems with conservatives, if he doesn't have electability on his side, this is how this bridge mess has had a real impact on his future."

After Senate Republicans rejected a bill to extend unemployment insurance to 1.3 million Americans struggling to get back on their feet, DNC Chair Debbie Wasserman Schultz released the following statement:

"Today, Republicans failed to extend a lifeline for Americans who are working to find jobs. These are Americans with skills, a desire to work, and in many cases, a family to support. Unemployment benefits make it possible for them to pay their bills and put food on the table. But because of Republicans' refusal to extend unemployment insurance benefits, millions of job-seeking Americans face a harsh and uncertain future.

"For all the recent talk by Republican leaders about reducing income inequality, today's vote reveals the emptiness of that rhetoric. And this is only the most recent rejection of the essential social safety net by a Republican Party that has a shameful record when it comes to encouraging economic mobility and reducing income inequality. The GOP has opposed Democrats' efforts to raise the minimum wage, and said no to Medicaid expansion through the Affordable Care Act, which has extended the promise of health care to millions. The failure to extend unemployment insurance benefits has the potential to cost the nation's economy 240,000 jobs in the year to come.

"Adding insult to injury, Republicans' opposition to extended unemployment benefits is bad policy. In 2012, unemployment benefits kept 2.5 million people out of poverty, including 600,000 children. Democrats will continue to fight to restore these crucial benefits until American workers are back on their feet. We need our friends across the aisle to join us."
